

- * Be Poised Don't let irritations bother you.
- * Have Humility Be confident, but not cocky. Don't be afraid to reveal you don't know everything.
- Be Responsible Live up to your word and duties.
- Be Cooperative Know how to work with others and enjoy working with them.
- Be a Fun-lover Enjoy life—the simple things as well as the big.
- * Have Vision Help the persons in your 4-H group to learn and grow through the 4-H activities.
- Be Clear Be able to express yourself effectively.
- Be Proud Proud of what you do. Take pride in being a 4-H leader, but earn it.
- Be Neat Always be neat in dress and personal appearance.
- * **Be Courteous** The word "please" and "thank you" pay dividends. Use them often.
- Think Ahead Know 4-H member's opinions and be ready to meet changing situations.
- Set Goals Make them high, but be sure to reach them.
- Take Advice But do your own thinking.
- Get the Facts Analyze them before you draw conclusions.
- * Do Your Best At all times. Plan to make the most effective use of your time.

Suggestions for Successful Still Exhibits

- All items, whether craft or clothing, will be clean both inside and out. Mending or other repairs neatly finished. Buttons, hems, seams, zippers, etc., trimmed and secured.
- 2. *Craft items* need to be clean or polished; any item to be hung requires a secure hanger. Photos and drawings should follow the exact specifications set forth in the Fair Premium. Exhibits that might break (i.e. model car) may be fastened to a base.
- 3. Food exhibits must be freshly made. Canning exhibits require two jar lids. Lids need to be tightly secured and natural colored. Dried foods need only one exhibit, but have requirements on the number items in the exhibit. Bakery exhibits have specific requirements as to number and amount. Follow instructions in the Fair Premium Book. Cover fresh baked goods with clear plastic wrap or place in Ziploc bags.

Steps of Success in 4-H

What does "member is good standing" mean? And what about "project completion"? The 4-H Policy Advisory Committee (consisting of 4-H members, adult volunteers, and 4-H YDP staff) defined these terms and documented the <u>Steps to Success</u> in 4-H such that there is consistency across the state.

As a state wide program delivered locally, key aspects of the program are standardized while also allowing some local level flexibility. For example, six hours of project instruction is required, but project leaders may require more based on the project and goals. Please review the <u>Steps to Success</u> in 4-H document for more information and not the changes are effective July 1.

Learn By Doing

<u>To Be a Successful Leader:</u> Be organized and set ground rules. Greet and engage the members, especially NEW members. Have eye contact with members. Don't babysit. Remember that you just can't please all the people, all the time. Change things up by adding different activities and field trips. Members must have sweat equity in fundraising. Know that all kids do not get along, no mater how hard you try. Understand that some parents don't realize the time it takes to be a leader. Grin a lot. Also taking deep breaths and counting to 10 <u>does</u> help.

<u>70 Be a Successful Member:</u> Keep your paperwork for each project in one folder. Have a 4-H calendar and post it where the family can see it and mark down all your activities. After each meeting write down the time, day and place of the meeting and what you did or learned. Be responsible for your own project, attend the required meetings for club and project, make your commitments. Call your leader or community club leader if you have any questions regarding the project. Welcome new members, always be kind and respectful. Thank your community club leader and project leaders after each meeting and occasionally with a hand-written note. <u>70 be a Successful Parent of a Member:</u> When possible, attend meetings with your child. After each meeting ask your child what they did at the meeting. Keep your commitments and help you child keep theirs. Pick up your child on time. Volunteer to do something with the pro-

ject or with the club. Contact the leader of community club leader with any issues or questions.
