Suggestions for Successful Still Exhibits

- 1. *All items*, whether craft or clothing, *will be clean* both inside and out. Mending or other repairs neatly finished. Buttons, hems, seams, zippers, etc., trimmed and secured.
- Craft items need to be clean or polished; any item to be hung requires a secure hanger. Photos and drawings should follow the exact specifications set forth in the Fair Premium. Exhibits that might break (i.e. model car) may be fastened to a base.
- 3. Food exhibits must be freshly made. Canning exhibits require two jar lids. Lids need to be tightly secured and natural colored. Dried foods need only one exhibit, but have requirements on the number items in the exhibit. Bakery exhibits have specific requirements as to number and amount. Follow instructions in the Fair Premium Book. Cover fresh baked goods with clear plastic wrap or place in Ziploc bags.

4-H Easter Egg Hunt

The weather held off until all the eggs were hidden and then decided to make it a wet Easter Egg Hunt for our participants on April 19th. Eggs were hidden in a larger area for our 6 and above group and they got quite wet searching for their eggs. Thanks to G.P.S. members, the prize eggs were strategically hidden throughout the area. The 5 and under group found their eggs quickly and had fun choosing their prizes. Approximately 20 youth scampered about to find the 550 hidden eggs.

Suggestions for Successful Livestock Exhibits

- Gather grooming aids, stall or pen cleaning tools, feed and other items together at least a week prior to weigh-in. Label with name of owner. Try on your uniform, clean, press, and <u>don't</u> lose it. Make a list of all needed items to be loaded the day of the Fair.
- Know how to load the exhibit animal. Start early! Keep stress for humans and livestock to the bare minimum. Have telephone numbers for the Project leader and other project members handy; then, if the truck won't start you'll have someone to call for assistance.
- 3. Practice grooming skills several times during the spring. Begin preparing the outer appearance of the animal according to the Project leader's instructions.
- 4. Practice showmanship techniques every chance you get. Animals will respond better to a familiar routine even when confronted with many other strange animals.
